Source F

Traders going to Timbuktu must cross the Sahara Desert. The difficulty of the journey causes many of them to die of thirst. Within this nothingness, there is a small region where one cannot find water for nine days. Travellers have to make do with the amount they carry on camels, and should not count on the occasional puddle due to rain.

Source G

On the way, the men faced many dangers, including being attacked by wild animals and poisonous snakes. We often walked at night when the temperature was cooler. The guides used the stars to help them find their way. They also knew the best paths and the friendliest villages to stop for food and shelter.

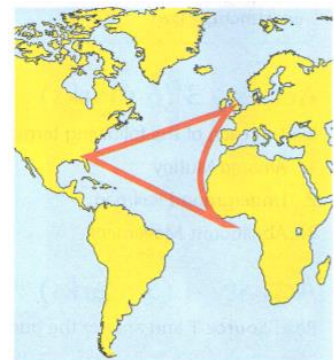
